Note:

- 1.The range of “totally collapsed” and “partially destroyed” is based on the judgment of the prefecture. “Partially destroyed” includes the case that a part of facilities is unusable , or some facilities are damaged.
2. The medical institutions accepting no patients in Fukushima include those located in the Restricted Area and Emergency Evacuation Preparedness Zone due to the accident at the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant of TEPCO.
3. With regard to Disaster Base Hospitals, Kamaishi Prefectural Hospital (Iwate pref.) and Ishinomaki Red Cross Hospital (Miyagi pref.) restricted acceptance of inpatients, and Minamisoma City General Hospital (Fukushima pref.) restricted acceptance of inpatient and outpatient.
4. The status of some of hospital is yet to be confirmed.
